"District Details"...a few notes from Superintendent Elwood

Department of Education Comprehensive Site Visit...

Every five years, the lowa Department of Education conducts a comprehensive site visit to assess each school's Comprehensive School Improvement Plan, provide a general assessment of educational practices within the district, make recommendations for improvement, and determine compliance with accreditation standards and federal program requirements. The Department of Education was here from January 21-23 to assess the Treynor Community School District. During the visit, the DE team reviewed documents, toured our facilities, heard an overview presentation, and conducted interviews with parents, students, teachers, support staff, administrators, community members,

advisory committee members and school board members. The DE site visit team was very impressed with all facets of the Treynor CSD. Over the next six weeks, the DE team leader will be compiling a final report to be shared with the school district. The final report will identify areas of strength, suggestions for improvement, and note any items that are non-compliant. We look forward to receiving feedback from the Department of Education and sharing their comments with our students, staff and community. Once the final report is available, it will be posted on the school's website for all to view.

CAUTION: Changes in weather arriving soon...

As the weather begins to change, school cancellations and early dismissals can occur at anytime. If severe weather causes school to be cancelled prior to the start of the day, we will try to have information to the media by 6:30 a.m. In addition to our school website, the media outlets that will carry our announcements this year are: **KMA**, **WOWT**, **KMTV and KETV**.



If weather or unforeseen circumstances (loss of power or water) should occur during the day and school is dismissed early, <u>PLEASE HAVE A PLAN IN PLACE WITH</u> <u>YOUR CHILD.</u> When early dismissals occur during the day, we usually have limited time to get information out and many parents aren't aware that an early out has taken

place. Also, we have over 750 students in the district and only a couple of phone lines in each building. Don't assume that your child will be able to call you if a decision is made to dismiss school during the regular day. Have a plan in place! The elementary has forms for each parent to keep updated outlining your family's specific plan to deal with this type of situation. Parents of middle school and high school students need to discuss with their child what plan of action they will take in the event of al early dismissal during the school day. Proper planning now will provide assurance to you and your child that all will be okay should we ever have an unfore-seen early dismissal.

A new Parent Notification system has been purchased to allow Treynor school officials to communicate school cancellations, early dismissals, emergency information, activity schedule changes and general notices or announcements to parents in a timely and efficient manner. Parents have the ability to sign up and select multiple methods for receiving notifications from the school (direct phone calls with recorded voice messages, text messages, emails, text-to-speech, TTY, Facebook, Twitter and RSS). THOUGHTS FROM THE HIGH	I SCHOOL PRINCIPAL
MR. NAVARA	

As a high school principal, you receive many professional publications to read and derive some understanding regarding education. After reading an article in one of those publications, I began to think on how the article relates to Treynor High School and our students. The article is titled "Closing the Attitude Gap" published in the January edition of <u>Principal Leadership</u>.

The title "Closing the Attitude Gap" brought forth a question. What is the attitude gap? The author Baruti Kafele defines attitude gap as "the gap between the students who have the will to strive for academic excellence and those who do

not." At THS we are fortunate to have a majority of students who strive for academic excellence; however, we cannot overlook those who do not. In continuing with the reading, it asked the question of "how do principals meet the challenge of motivating the unmotivated to have the desire to excel?" This is a question which is always asked not just by principals, but also by teachers. Baruti Kafele stated that "ultimately, the student must want it from within." I agree with that statement. The old saying of "you can lead a horse to water, but you can't make it drink" came to my mind. I also agree with their next finding. Administrators must pay attention to the climate and culture of their schools. The article defined climate and culture as "its' collective attitude." The collective attitude is the "mood (climate) and the lifestyle (culture) of the school." What is the mood and lifestyle that our students are walking into everyday? And how that mood and lifestyle affects the strive for excellence in our building. The article stated the focus on five key areas to ensure a school's climate and culture is conducive to closing the "attitude gap".

1. Environment for Learning

C.

- a. What does the overall learning environment look like at the school and classroom levels?
- b. Is it a true environment of excellence?
 - 4 essential daily questions should be asked for an understanding of this area.
 - i. What do all students see in their classrooms that is reflective of them?
 - ii. How often do students hear that they are special, great or extraordinary?
 - iii. Do students feel comfortable exhibiting their brilliance without negative consequences and ridicule from their peers?
 - iv. Is learning fun, stimulating and engaging, yet rigorous and relevant?
- 2. Attitude toward Students
 - a. Teachers need to demonstrate to students that they believe in them despite the behaviors that students might exhibit.
- 3. Relationships with Students
 - a. Do teachers know their students beyond their names?
 - b. How do students learn, what inspires their learning, what motivates them, their experiences and realities, their challenges and obstacles?
 - c. We must genuinely know our students.
- 4. Compassion for Students
 - a. It is important for teachers to demonstrate care, concern and compassion.
 - b. However, it is also the students' perception of whether or not teachers care about them.
 - 5. Relevance in Instruction
 - a. Students must be able to see themselves both historically and culturally in their lessons.

It is my conclusion that THS does some of these areas well and we have areas in need of growth. It is my job to lead in answering all of these questions. It is a large task, but a task which needs to be addressed, studied and worked on at THS. This task is one that challenges us and energizes us to become better. Striving for excellence is not only for the students.

Cardinal Financial Literacy Update

50 TIPS FOR FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE

Here are some words of wisdom along with 50 tips for becoming financially independent at different stages of life. These ideas were excerpted from the *Yes, You Can...* series of books.

For Younger Kids

"If you don't talk to your kids about money, who will?" 1. Develop your role as a Chief Financial Parent (CFP)

by talking to your kids about the value of money. 2. Tell them family money stories about your earlier years and how their grandparents handled financial hardships and successes. 3. Be a good role model by letting your kids see you manage the household budget and pay bills. 4. Give them an allowance, so you can teach them to manage their own money. 5. Hold family meetings and let your kids participate in spending decisions for everyday expenses. 6. Discuss the difference between needs and wants – and how to pay for them. 7. Take your kids to the bank and set up a savings account for each one. 8. Give them opportunities to earn extra money and let them decide how to use it. 9. Instead of always rewarding them with cash, express your family's values by offering a family outing or other type of reward. 10. Encourage your kids to give some of their money - and their time - to a charity or cause they choose. For Teenagers "If you are going to help your kids achieve financial independence, help them understand the need to control their wants." 1. Encourage your teens to earn money by starting a neighborhood service business. 2. If they run out of cash, don't give them more money or an advance. 3. Teach your kids how to comparison shop for brand names, price, quantity and size. 4. Take them to a flea market to see the savings from buying used items - and drive home the benefits of recycling. 5. Let your teens open a checking account and learn to balance the checkbook. 6. Allow them to use a debit card, so they can't spend more than they have in their account. 7. If your older teens get a credit card, have them set aside the money spent so they can pay the bill when it arrives. 8. Discuss whether they can handle a part-time job without neglecting their schoolwork. 9. Ask your older teens to serve as your money apprentice for a month, being responsible for writing out checks for every bill. 10. Help them set financial goals like saving money to buy a car. Ask them to plan for how they will pay for fuel, insurance and repairs.

Completing the FAFSA

February is a good month to get the FAFSA filed. If any students want to apply for financial aid, the FAFSA must be filed either electronically or on paper. FAFSA Day will be February 21 at Treynor High School. Seniors should have received a letter explaining the FAFSA Day and how it will work. It is totally optional to participate in the FAFSA Day, but if a senior family does not participate, they are still responsible to file the FAFSA on their own.

Why complete the FAFSA?

- 1. To qualify for federal and state financial aid programs based on need.
- 2. To be eligible for a federal Stafford student loan regardless of need or income.
- 3. Some colleges want a FAFSA filed before they distribute their own institutional financial aid (scholarships and activity awards)
- 4. Some scholarships require page one of the Student Aid Report to be included with scholarship materials. The Student Aid Report is generated by completing the FAFSA.
- The FAFSA is free and it can possibly yield positive benefits. With some assistance and organization, it is not difficult to complete.
- 6. If a parent employment status would change due to illness or loss of job, it is nice to have filed a FAFSA for financial aid assistance.
- 7. You never know for sure what your financial aid status is until you complete the FAFSA.

Financial Aid Priority Dates

Be sure to complete the FAFSA before the financial aid priority date of the colleges that your student is considering. Those dates are listed in the ICAN *Financial Aid Guide* distributed at the financial aid meeting in November. See the Financial Aid page under Counseling of the Treynor school website to access the ICAN *Financial Aid Guide*.

Financial Aid Award Letters

To receive a financial aid award letter from a college, a student must have applied and been accepted to the college. The college needs to be listed on the FAFSA to receive the FAFSA information.

Student Aid Reports

After completing the FAFSA, the Department of Education will send a Student Aid Report (SAR) in which all the information entered in the FAFSA will be listed. Keep the SAR for future reference. If any of the

information is not correct, contact your college financial aid office(s) and they can correct the errors for you.

If your student becomes interested in a college that was not listed on your FAFSA, you may call the college financial aid office and give them the DRN code listed on the SAR and they will be able to download the information from the FAFSA for the student.

Verification

Some colleges may send you a letter requesting verification of the numbers on the FAFSA. This does not mean that you made a mistake or are being accused of providing false information. Colleges are required to verify a certain percent of their incoming students by random draw. Some colleges require all prospective students to verify information. Follow the directions of the college financial aid office in completing verification. It is not a threatening process..

Getting Help with the FAFSA

ICAN has a regional office located on the campus of IWCC in Council Bluffs. Call the ICAN number (877-272-4692) to schedule an appointment at IWCC. No cost for the FAFSA appointment.
- College Goal Sunday. This is an event in which volunteers are available to help parents complete the FAFSA free of cost. College Goal Sunday events will be held in Council Bluffs. Go to <u>www.lowaCGS.org</u> for information and dates.
- Federal Department of Education 800-4-FED-AID (800-433-3243)
- Call your prospective college's financial aid office.
- Contact your school counselor
- To file the FAFSA on-line, go to <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u>.



Registering with the Selective Service

Most male students must be registered with the Selective Service to receive federal student aid. Students who register for the Selective Service may use the FAFSA to do so. One of the questions on the FAFSA asks a male applicant if he wants the Selective Service to register him. Students can call the Selective Service toll free at 888-655-1825 for general information about registering or access. It is required by law that all males that reach the age of 18 must register with the Selective Service. The web site for the Selective Service is <u>www.sss.gov</u>.

Tips for Filing the FAFSA

From the Iowa College Access Network® (ICAN)

January marks the start of financial aid season for students planning to attend college this fall. Students need to fill out and file their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form to qualify for federal financial aid. The FAFSA is a free form available from the U.S. Department of Education either online at <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> or on paper by calling (800) 4-FED-AID. Although students and parents can fill out the form without professional assistance, the forms are often confusing. Use these tips to help ensure the FAFSA is correctly filled out.

Get PINs. Each student and at least one parent should request a personal identification number (PIN) from <u>www.pin.ed.gov</u> prior to filling out the FAFSA. The PIN allows parents and students to sign the online form electronically and make changes later.

Time it right. The FAFSA should be filed as soon after Jan. 1 as possible and before the priority filing deadlines at schools the student is applying to. Since students' and parents' most recent federal and state tax records are needed to fill out the form, the timing can be tricky. If necessary, tax and income information can be estimated to

file the FAFSA in a timely manner; the FAFSA will need to be updated once taxes are filed.

Be complete and accurate. Filers should read all the directions carefully and fill out the form completely and accurately. Students and parents with questions can visit <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> or contact the Iowa College Access Network (ICAN) for free assistance. Call (877) 272-4692 to make an appointment for one-on-one help over the phone or in either the Cedar Rapids or West Des Moines College Planning Center.

File electronically. Filing electronically is quicker than completing a paper form. Electronic filing also reduces errors and speeds up processing time.

Repeat once a year. The FAFSA needs to be filled out each year students plan to attend college.

Scholarship Central is your one-stop information page on scholarships. Access this page through at <u>www.treynorschools.org</u> and click on Counseling. This page is exclusively devoted to scholarship information. There are download links, updated scholarship information, and helpful links for scholarship information and searches.

The uniform application for all Treynor local scholarships may be downloaded from the page. The deadline to apply is March 17, 2014.

The Iowa College Access Network (ICAN) recommends the following steps for scholarship applications.

- Start early and don't stop. If you're in high school, begin searching for scholarships early in your junior year. Many opportunities exist for college students as well, so you should continue looking for them into your final year of college.
- Look locally first. Ask your school counselor or college financial aid office about opportunities they're aware of. Then contact community and religious organizations, your and your parents' employers, professional organizations and area businesses.
- Expand your search. Check with the college you plan to attend and any student organizations you are or plan to be involved with. Don't pay for scholarship services; free online search services can match your unique background and qualifications against a database of scholarship opportunities.
- Get organized. Keep applications, deadlines and requirements for each scholarship together, and make a plan for submitting everything on time. Remember to give people plenty of time to write letters of recommendation for you.
- **Understand the mission.** Take the time to understand the goal of the organization awarding the scholarship. You can then demonstrate how your qualifications promote or meet that goal.
- Complete the form neatly and accurately. If you're submitting a paper application, make a copy
 of it first. You can use the copy as a rough draft and use the original for your final answers. Make
 sure you fill in every line legibly and accurately.
- Show your best side. Remember that your scholarship application is likely the only impression the judges will have of you, so offer the best picture you can by being professional, using vivid examples and expressing your excitement about and gratitude for the opportunity.
- Write a winning essay. Address the topic completely while including details about yourself and your ideas. Develop a theme around your main topic. Your essay should follow a logical order and conclude smoothly. Have others read it for errors and proofread it carefully.
- Include a resume or profile. List your memberships, participation, honors and awards, employment, and future plans and goals.
- Mind the little things. When you submit your application, pay attention to the details: Include
 materials in the order requested, don't include extra materials and don't use special packaging or
 folders unless you're asked to do so.
