"District Details"...a few notes from Superintendent Elwood

2015-16 School Calendar

As the 2015 legislative session gets underway, the news out of Des Moines has focused on school start dates and funding for education. Iowa Code currently states schools cannot begin prior to the week of September 1 unless the local Board of Education requests a waiver from the Department of Education. For years, this has been the standard procedure and 99% of schools each year apply and receive the waiver. However, this year Governor Branstad (along with support of the state tourism industry) has indicated that the Department of Education should no longer grant waivers and require schools to begin the week of September 1.



School start date for 2015-16 hinges on Iowa legislature's decision.

At Treynor, after years of tweaking our calendar and determining what works for the majority of our local families, we traditionally start around mid-August and dismiss prior to Memorial Day. For the 2015-16 school year, if we follow our traditional calendar, school will begin around August 20 and dismiss around May 20. However, if required by the State to begin per Iowa Code, it is likely we will begin around September 1 and dismiss about June 3.

The current issue in front of legislators is who is best positioned to make decisions about the school start date? Should your local school start date be set by a district's local Board of Education or should it be regulated by the Governor and/or those promoting the lowa State Fair?

Unfortunately, the 2015-16 Treynor school calendar will not be set until the legislature makes a decision on this issue. Many legislators are interested in hearing the opinion of their constituents. If you have an opinion on this topic, feel free to share your thoughts with the legislators which represent the Treynor School District:

CAUTION: Changes in weather arriving soon...

As the weather begins to change, school cancellations and early dismissals can occurat anytime. If severe weather causes school to be cancelled prior to the start of the day, we will try to have information to the media by 6:30 a.m. In addition to our school website, the media outlets that will carry our announcements this year are: KMA, WOWT, KMTV and KETV.



If weather or unforeseen circumstances (loss of power or water) should occur during the day and school is dismissed early, <u>PLEASE HAVE A PLAN IN PLACE WITH</u> <u>YOUR CHILD.</u> When early dismissals occur during the day, we usually have limited

time to get information out and many parents aren't aware that an early out has taken place. Also, we have over 750 students in the district and only a couple of phone lines in each building. Don't assume that your child will be able to call you if a decision is made to dismiss school during the regular day. Have a plan in place! The elementary has forms for each parent to keep updated outlining your family's specific plan to deal with this type of situation. Parents of middle school and high school students need to discuss with their child what plan of action they will take in the event of al early dismissal during the school day. Proper planning now will provide assurance to you and your child that all will be okay should we ever have an unforeseen early dismissal.

A new Parent Notification system has been purchased to allow Treynor school officials to communicate school cancellations, early dismissals, emergency information, activity schedule changes and general notices or announcements to parents in a timely and efficient manner. Parents have the ability to sign up and select multiple methods for receiving notifications from the school (direct phone calls with recorded voice messages, text messages, emails, text-to-speech, TTY, Facebook, Twitter and RSS). OPEN ENROLLMENT DEADLINE

Parents/guardians considering the use of the open enrollment option to enroll their child/children in another public school district in the state of Iowa should be aware of the following dates:

March 1, 2015: the last date for regular open enrollment requests for the 2015-2016 school year, except for "good cause" reasons or kindergarten applications.

Kindergarten applications must be filed on or before September 1 of the school year in which open enrollment is requested. (September 1, 2015 for the 2015-2016 school year).

THOUGHTS FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL..... MR. NAVARA

As a high school principal, you receive many professional publications to read and derive some understanding regarding education. After reading an article in one of those publications, I began to think on how the article relates to Treynor High School and our students. The article is titled "Closing the Attitude Gap" published in the January edition of <u>Principal Leadership</u>.

The title "Closing the Attitude Gap" brought forth a question. What is the attitude gap? The author Baruti Kafele defines attitude gap as "the gap between the students who have the will to strive for academic excellence and those who do



not." At THS we are fortunate to have a majority of students who strive for academic excellence; however, we cannot overlook those who do not. In continuing with the reading, it asked the question of "how do principals meet the challenge of motivating the unmotivated to have the desire to excel?" This is a question which is always asked not just by principals, but also by teachers. Baruti Kafele stated that "ultimately, the student must want it from within." I agree with that statement. The old saying of "you can lead a horse to water, but you can't make it drink" came to my mind. I also agree with their next finding. Administrators must pay attention to the climate and culture of their schools. The article defined climate and culture as "its' collective attitude." The collective attitude is the "mood (climate) and the lifestyle (culture) of the school." What is the mood and lifestyle that our students are walking into everyday? And how that mood and lifestyle affects the strive for excellence in our building. The article stated the focus on five key areas to ensure a school's climate and culture is conducive to closing the "attitude gap".

1. Environment for Learning

c.

- a. What does the overall learning environment look like at the school and classroom levels?
- b. Is it a true environment of excellence?
 - 4 essential daily questions should be asked for an understanding of this area.
 - i. What do all students see in their classrooms that is reflective of them?
 - ii. How often do students hear that they are special, great or extraordinary?
 - iii. Do students feel comfortable exhibiting their brilliance without negative consequences and ridicule from their peers?
 - iv. Is learning fun, stimulating and engaging, yet rigorous and relevant?
- 2. Attitude toward Students
 - a. Teachers need to demonstrate to students that they believe in them despite the behaviors that students might exhibit.
- 3. Relationships with Students
 - a. Do teachers know their students beyond their names?
 - b. How do students learn, what inspires their learning, what motivates them, their experiences and realities, their challenges and obstacles?
 - c. We must genuinely know our students.
- 4. Compassion for Students
 - a. It is important for teachers to demonstrate care, concern and compassion.
 - b. However, it is also the students' perception of whether or not teachers care about them.
 - 5. Relevance in Instruction
 - a. Students must be able to see themselves both historically and culturally in their lessons.

It is my conclusion that THS does some of these areas well and we have areas in need of growth. It is my job to lead in answering all of these questions. It is a large task, but a task which needs to be addressed, studied and worked on at THS. This task is one that challenges us and energizes us to become better. Striving for excellence is not only for the students.

Help Young People Learn the Joy of Giving



There's a good chance you've heard of Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation, started by Alexandra "Alex" Scott who - at a very young age - bravely battled her own cancer while raising money by selling lemonade to help other kids who were also fighting the disease. When Alex was just four, she held her first lemonade stand, raising an amazing \$2,000. Touched by her story and determination to help other sick children, people from all over the world began holding their own lemonade stands and donating the proceeds to Alex and her cause. By the time she passed away at the age of 8, Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation had raised more than \$1 million to help find a cure for the disease that took her life.

Alex clearly had a reason for her commitment to help others,

but how do parents inspire today's young children to become engaged in charitable giving? Two crucial elements are parental involvement and encouragement. When children see the adults in their lives actively involved in philanthropic causes, it can inspire the children to find their own causes they want to support. And, the sooner they start, the more likely it'll make a lasting impression.

Here are some other steps parents can take to help teach their young children the joy of helping others:

Start young. Begin encouraging philanthropy as soon as your children can grasp the concept. Giving doesn't need to be financial; children can also volunteer their time. Some families encourage giving at a young age by using a piggy bank with three containers - one for saving; one for spending; and, one for sharing.

Make the experience relevant and hands-on. According to Alison Sirkus Brody, Program Officer for The Women's Foundation of California, parents should not only intentionally model philanthropic behavior, they should also give their child an opportunity to experience it. Otherwise, philanthropy remains just another concept that they watch you do.

For example, if your child is an animal lover, consider suggesting that his or her next birthday party support a local animal shelter. All of the children attending can bring supplies for the shelter. Check with the shelter to see if you can bring all of the attendees to visit on the day of the party so everyone gets to see where their gift is going and how it benefits the animals in the shelter. When children can see how their gifts will actually be put to use, it can make a real impact on them.

Establish a structure for giving and make it a regular practice. As mentioned above, some parents encourage their children to divide their allowance into three parts... one-third to save, one-third to spend and one-third to give away. Other parents help their kids identify other giving opportunities - such as birthday parties and/or holidays - where children can offer gifts and/or valuable supplies for a local charity or family in need.

Whichever path you choose, it's important to make it a regular practice. Just as children learn about money by watching their parents, they also learn about philanthropy by observing the adults in their life.


