
TEACHER APPRECIATION WEEK

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DISTRICT TECHNOLOGY UPGRADES

BOARD APPROVES CHROMEBOOK PURCHASE FOR MIDDLE & HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS ALONG WITH SHIFTING IPADS TO THE ELEMENTARY



During their April meeting, the Treynor Board of Education approved the purchase of Chromebooks for 6th through 12th grade students. The newest lightweight Dell Chromebook model features a gorilla glass touch screen, 180-degree hinge, extra protection from drops and spills, and an excellent battery life. The Dell Chromebook was selected as the new 1:1 device after a Technology Committee spent the year researching Chromebook use in schools, examining the needs of Treynor School District students and staff, and evaluating several different brands and models of Chromebooks.

The new Chromebooks will replace the aging IBM Lenovo Laptops that were rolled out to 9th through 12th grade students for the District's first 1:1 initiative in January, 2012. In September of 2013, iPads were rolled out to all Middle School students. Even though the iPads are not yet out of date, Chromebooks will be provided in grades 6 -8 so that Middle School and High School students are using the same device and platform. The current Middle School iPads will be shifted to the elementary this summer. Treynor Elementary currently has about 100 iPads which were purchased in the spring of 2013. With the addition of 200+ iPads coming from the Middle School and the existing elementary computer labs, Treynor Elementary is close to achieving a 1:1 student to computer ratio.

The Board approved using PPEL funds to purchase the 475 Chromebooks for the price of \$299.03 per device. After totaling all costs associated with purchasing the Chromebooks, Google Management license, Hapara add-on software, HDMI/VGA adapters and additional iPad charging carts for the elementary, the technology upgrade cost will be \$160,266.69.

The new Chromebooks will be handed out to students the first week of school in August, 2015. The Technology Committee will plan a Chromebook Boot Camp to get students on the fast track to learning more about their new devices and how to properly care for them. With parent approval, Middle School and High School students will be allowed to take the devices home each night so that they can continue their learning process after they leave school. Students will be responsible for caring for their device, and will need to purchase their own laptop bag, case or backpack with separate laptop slot to transport these devices between home and school.

BUSINESS CLASSES & "CARDINAL CART"

The business classes are finding out first-hand what is involved in operating a business. For the past two months, they have been planning, managing, and operating the "Cardinal Cart," a cart that serves snacks and drinks during Card Pride.

The Entrepreneurship class took this new business from an idea to an operating business. The class identified their target market and chose items that they thought will be appealing to this group. After conducting research on the healthy food guidelines required for K-12 schools, they chose their product offering to meet those guidelines. Class members are Tanner Kaeding, Trey Robinson, and Steph Sudan.



The Marketing class was recruited to help with the marketing efforts which includes social media, promotion, distribution, product, and pricing. Prices were set after calculating the cost per item and sales were estimated based on number of students. Class members are Sarah Duysen, Michael Godfrey, Emma Kaeding, and Travis Manzer.

The Accounting class keeps financial records for the Cardinal Cart, and will be creating financial statements after recording transactions and sales. Class members are Travis Manzer, Trey Robinson, and Steph Sudan.

Through this experience, the business classes have learned that customer behavior is not easy to predict and how important it is to adapt to changing conditions. Operating a business takes planning, good decision making, good record-keeping, and teamwork... all skills they have developed in this project.

Making Summer Meaningful
