"District Details"...a few notes from Superintendent Howell

The Treynor Community School District is joining other public education systems throughout the state to salute our local school board members and celebrate public education during lowa's annual School Board Recognition Month in May.

The commemorative month is designed to recognize the contributions made by more than 2,000 local school board, community college and AEA board members, including the members of our Treynor Board of Education, who are charged with governing public education under state law.

Our school board members have been chosen by you through election to manage our district. They oversee an annual budget of \$14 million, more than 850 students, and 109 employees.

These volunteer leaders on our Treynor Board of Education also are responsible for formulating school board/system policy, approving curricula, maintaining school facilities and adhering to state and federal education law. Legal concerns and the complexities of school finance, including budgeting and taxation, require them to spend many hours in board training programs and personal study to enhance their understanding of these issues.

NEW!!! STUDENT REGISTRATION FOR 2018-19

In an effort to streamline the student registration process and to eliminate the need for parents to physically come to school to register their students, online registration will be available for returning students for the 2018-19 school year. This will be a significant change from the past process so please be watching for email notices containing important information.

An email notification will be sent before the end of the school year outlining the information that will be necessary to complete the online registration process. Another email notification will be sent this summer announcing the opening of online registration and how to navigate the new process. PaySchools will be used for payment for textbook fees, lunch accounts, etc. This will be the same process currently used for paying lunch accounts online and will include a credit card/ACH fee. If you do not want to pay online, payment can be made with cash or check and dropping it off on Registration Day on August 1.

New students to the district, those families without access to the technology for online registration and any parents who have experienced issues with the online process are asked to attend Registration Day at the high school building on Wednesday, August 1 anytime from 2:00 – 7:00 p.m,. Please keep in mind that this registration time will not be staffed at the same level as in previous years and you may encounter a longer wait time.

Your cooperation is appreciated as the new registration process is implemented. This change is coming about due to suggestions from parents, faculty and staff and also because online registration is made possible

FROM THE ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL'S DESK

It's hard to believe that we are entering our final month of school for the 17-18 school year. Our students and staff have worked tirelessly all year learning and growing. Every time I step into classrooms, I'm able to see first-hand how incredibly hard everyone in the building is working.

In the last few weeks, students in grades three through five participated in the lowa Assessments. This is a statewide assessment that all students in grades three through twelve who attend lowa public schools must take. In our building, we took Reading, Math and Science. Results will be sent home later this month.

In addition to taking the Iowa Assessments, students also took the statewide FAST test (Formative Assessment Systems for Teachers) last week. This is a literacy test that students take in the fall, winter and spring. The FAST test measures automaticity, or the ability to read words without thinking about it on a conscious level. It also measures how well students are comprehending what they are reading.

When interpreting your child's progress this year, please keep in mind that the lowa Assessments and FAST tests are only snapshots of progress and consideration should be given to all of the information received from the school. This may include daily work, classroom assessments, progress and grade reports and conversations during parent-teacher conferences. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact your child's teacher.

COMPUTER SCIENCE COURSE TRAINING



Teachers representing both large and small school districts across the state of lowa officially completed their training with NewBoCo's Computer Science Professional Learning Program earlier this month. The program, made possible through a partnership with Code.org, a national nonprofit dedicated to expanding access to computer science education, provides professional development at no cost to teachers wanting to bring computer science courses to their school district.

Part of the Professional Learning Program includes a commitment to implementing the computer science course during the year that they participate in the program. The 32 teachers in the 2017–2018 cohort went above and beyond their commitment. In this school year alone, they taught 1,774 students computer science—providing access to many students that did not have an opportunity before.

"Even if a student doesn't become a computer programmer, computer science is a fundamental part of education in the 21st century. Computer science teaches communication, problem solving, and creativity—skills necessary in almost every profession. Having access to these classes will help lowa's students become prepared for a future where they use technology as more than a passive consumer," said Aaron Horn, NewBoCo Chief Operating Officer and Executive Director.

NewBoCo partnered with Code.org to launch the Professional Learning Program in 2016. At the time, <u>an estimated 75% of lowa's public schools</u> were not able to offer computer science courses.

One of the major barriers most districts face is that they do not have a teacher trained to teach a high-quality computer science course. NewBoCo's Professional Learning Program trains in-service teachers how to teach computer science—even if they don't have a computer science background. English, business, history, in addition to math and science teachers, have successfully implemented computer science.

"I wanted to bring in computer science to our school and didn't know where to start. Now I have the knowledge and confidence to start computer science at our small school," said Jennifer Anderson, a teacher at Treynor High School in Western Iowa.

NewBoCo plans to expand the Professional Learning Program for the 2018–2019 school year with support from the Iowa Governor's STEM Council through their <u>STEM Scale-Up Program</u>. Samantha Dahlby, NewBoCo K-12 Education Coordinator and Code.org Program Manager, says they've received more than 100 applications from teachers across the state, and she expects to double the number of teachers participating this year.

"Funding from the STEM Council and individual donors helps us keep our promise to never pass the cost of professional development on to Iowa's teachers," Dahlby said.




"Our goal is to ensure that every school in Iowa has a certified computer science teacher by 2022," Dahlby said.

COMMIT TO BE FIT!

- ♦ Good oral hygiene can enhance the natural beauty of your smile.

MS/HS IMMUNIZATIONS FOR 2018-19

7th Grade

For the 2018-19 school year, the incoming 7th graders are required to have two vaccines prior to the start of school next fall:

Tdap 1 time dose

Meningococcal (A, C, W, Y) Vaccine received on or after age 10

12th Grade

For the 2018-19 school year, the incoming 12th graders are required to have **2 doses of the meningococcal (A,C,W,Y) vaccine** prior to the start of school next fall, or 1 dose if received when the student was 16 years of age or older.

<u>Please note</u>: There is <u>NO</u> grace period of time for these immunizations and students will not be allowed to attend school unless we have documentation of the immunizations

MULCH MADNESS BLANKETS TREES

60 Fifth Grade students spread over 3-tons of landscape mulch around over 100 trees at the Treynor High School campus on Tuesday, April 10. As part of their annual Arbor Day observance, the Pottawattamie Master Gardeners, and the Treynor Optimist Club volunteers organize the event annually. Typically, three or more 5-gallon buckets of mulch go around each tree. The school provided the mulch, which was delivered by Optimist volunteers and trailers. Home Depot Company donated the buckets for the kids to use to carry the mulch to each tree.

Mulch under the trees holds in moisture and cools the soil in the hot summer.—This helps the tree grow faster. Mulch also discourages grass growth around the tree, which then keeps the lawn mowers away from the thin delicate bark of the tree that is their living tissue. "Mower Blight" is the leading cause of damage to new trees everywhere.—Mulch is also a good use of recyclable wood material.

At Treynor, the 5th grade class mulches annually. On even numbered years, they mulch trees on the High School and Middle School campus. On odd numbered years, they mulch at the Elementary School campus. In addition to helping the trees, the activity teaches an environmental ethic about nature and caring for their own school to these Fifth Graders.

"We want to recommend this project to our neighboring Elementary Schools. The school benefits, the trees benefit, and the students learn many valuable lessons. It is not expensive and it is easy to organize and do. Contact the Extension Service about proper mulching and involve local people in the school activity." said John Klein, Treynor Optimist organizer.
