## "District Details"...a few notes from Lou Howell

Can you believe it is already October? Fall is here even though we haven't experienced many crisp evenings yet! (I will take "crisp" over "snow" anytime!) Homecoming is this week! The kids are all excited about the parade and game on Friday, not to mention the competitions going on this week with hall decorations and JV football, cross country, and volleyball keeping us busy on the other evenings!



Learning has been a priority—for all of us!

We had four great candidates run for the Treynor Board of Education – many thanks to Lisa Chambers, Greg Goos, Mickey Stogdill, and Brandon Vorthmann. The Treynor Education Association

hosted a forum that many attended to learn the priorities of each of the candidates. Mickey Stogdill and Brandon Vorthmann will join the board on October 16. We are all excited to learn with and from them in order to make the best decisions for our students and the staff that supports them.

Learning has been a priority for me – learning about the district, about the staff, the students and their learning. A special highlight has been visiting the classrooms – seeing kids engaged in their learning. Another highlight was riding the bus, seeing how Treynor has changed since I taught here many (and I mean MANY) years ago. I was even invited by a second grader to come play after school. "I know my mom wouldn't care and I have lots of toys." So fun to see the kids in their world – on the bus, in the classrooms, and at the games!

Learning has also been a priority of our staff. They have been learning how to implement PLCs. PLC??, you ask. A PLC is a professional learning community; it is an opportunity for teachers to meet in content-alike or grade-alike teams to address the progress students are making with their learning. The teachers look at data, discuss reasons for the success or lack of it, and identify strategies to increase that success. We even have virtual PLCs, where our "singleton" teachers are connecting with other teachers in our conference. For example, our English 9 teacher is able to connect with other English 9 teachers to develop assessments, explore impacting learning strategies, and get feedback on units for learning.

The high school students and the entire K-12 staff had training in digital communication. A key phrase was "think twice, post once." This is a great area for all parents to take time with your children. How do I best protect my kids online? The answer – talk with them. While kids value the opinions of their peers, most tend to rely on you for help on the issues that matter most. A few tips include these:

- Initiate the conversation. Talk to them about the impact of cyberbullying or texting while driving. There are many real-life stories that you see in the news that can spur the conversation.
- Share your expectations. Communicate your values for online communications.
   Be specific about what's off limits and what you consider to be unacceptable behavior.

- Be patient and supportive. Most of us need to hear things seven times before it finally "sinks in." Share expectations often and in small doses. Be open to helping them find viable solutions to on-line problems they encounter.
- For your younger kids, direct supervision is so important. Consider using tools that help filter and block incoming communications. Don't allow your kids to share personal information online or via e-mail. Access kid-oriented search engines. Monitor the time they can be online.
- For "tweens" and teens, talk about credibility not everything on line is true; not everyone on line is a good person. Talk about manners and your expectations. Remind them that online actions have consequences. Caution them to "think twice, post once," as they cannot take it back.
- As a parent, explain what you expect and why, set an example, safeguard privacy, use secure networks and websites, and log out when you have finished using a site. And never text while driving!

On September 6, Bank Iowa announced the results of the Bank Iowa Traveling Challenge Cup for the 2016-2017 school year. Treynor High School placed 8th out of the 96 schools in Class 2A in the state of Iowa. We also placed the the top 10% of all schools regardless of size.

The Bank Iowa Traveling Challenge Cup was introduced in 2007 and is a statewide competition designed to recognize Iowa high school students for academic excellence and outstanding achievement during state competitions. Points are assigned for every activity in which a school reaches a state competition, advances in a state competition, receives Division I ratings and earns academic recognition from either the IHSAA, IGHSAU, IHSSA and IHSMA. Standings are determined based on the best combined score.

After 18 years of funding Treynor youth groups, the popular Optimist Club Can Kennel has reached the collection of \$150,000 from 5-cent cans and bottles. This is all thanks to the wonderful contribution of the people of Treynor and surrounding areas. A wide variety of youth groups have received funds. Twelve groups per year get can collection funding. Those youth have to sort the redeemable nickel cans and bottles twice in a four week period.

If all the cans and bottles from the Can Kennel were five inch cans, and then were laid end to end, the 3,000,000 can row would travel 237 miles, or from Treynor to Muscatine, Iowa on the Mississippi River.

The Can Kennel is only for nickel deposit beverage containers. It is not for water bottles, juice bottles or milk jugs. Thanks goes to the volunteer Optimist Club members that help the youth groups at each sorting, and to the City of Treynor for allowing the Can Kennel to be on the east end of the Community Center parking lot.

Every Treynor student has benefited from the proceeds. Music groups, athletics, scouts, church youth, 4-H clubs, After-Prom, and elementary school activities have all received funding. Your continued support is appreciated!

### **OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR 2018-2019**

**March 1, 2018:** the last date for regular open enrollment requests for the 2018-2019 school year, except for "good cause" reasons or kindergarten applications.

Kindergarten applications must be filed on or before September 1 of the school year in which open enrollment is requested. (September 1, 2018 for the 2018-2019 school year).

### **COMMIT TO BE FIT!** If we are reaching for a can of pop when we're thirsty, we may want to reconsider the impact on our body and our teeth. We are consuming a surprising amount of sugar and empty calories. Here are a few suggestions to help us reduce the number of sugary drinks we consume: 1. Keep track of how many sugary beverages we drink in a day and how many our kids are drinking. Can we replace just one each day with milk or water? 2. Buy a refillable water bottle. 3. Show our kids how much sugar is actually in one soda. A 20-ounce can of cola has 17.6 teaspoons of sugar! Drinking one 20-ounce soda every day can contribute enough extra calories to equal 27 pounds per year! Explain how long it takes to burn off the calories from drinking a single sugary beverage. To offset the calo-4. ries in one 20-ounce soda, we'd have to walk at a moderate pace for two hours. 5. If we do have a soda, opt for the smallest size. Set a good example. Kids are more likely to do what we do, not what we say. ### \$25,000 GRANT AWARDED TO JOI/KKAD25



The Junior Optimist and Treynor Keep Kids Alive Drive 25 Committee members have been waiting patiently since August 25th when voting closed on the <u>State Farm Neighborhood Assist</u> website. Before the last day of voting, the committee's project, Tristan's Trail, was in 5th place. On the last day, voting was still open but the places were removed from the website so that votes could be counted and verified, so final placement wasn't really known until last evening, September 27th. At 11:00 pm CST (Midnight EST), the results were posted and Tristan's Trail was revealed as 1 of 40 recipients of a \$25,000 grant. The original proposals were selected from 2,000 submissions and narrowed down to 200. Of those 200, the top 40 were selected by public voting via email.

Tristan's Trail is not only a dream to keep Tristan White's memory alive, but will allow a place for Treynor Cardinal Athletes and community members to walk, run or bike. The \$25,000 grant will go a long way for the planning and design of the trail. More funds will be needed to make the trail a reality, but with the outpouring of support for this project, the committee feels confident this will happen.

#### **EXPECTATIONS AT SPECTATOR EVENTS**

Parents, we are asking for your help in discussing with your child expectations we have when they attend extracurricular activities. For elementary students, we ask that your child sit with you or another adult to cheer on the Cardinals. We understand that our students like to hang out with friends and in our opinion, there is no reason they still can't do this in the stands while cheering on our team!

When events are within the building, we ask that your child stay in the gym, either sitting in the designated student section for middle/high School students or with you for elementary students.

When attending football games, we again ask that you talk to your children about sitting in the stands to cheer on our team, particularly any of our kids in middle/high school. There are some parents who like to stand at football games and we simply ask that your children stay in close proximity to you so that they are supervised and safe.

Finally, please do not bring any extra items to games, such as balls of any type, Frisbees, skateboards, rip sticks, etc.

Our hope is that we all work together in promoting school spirit and positive sportsmanship during all of our extra-curricular activiites. Thank you, in advance, for your support and help in making sure all of our kids are properly supervised and involved in cheering on our team.

Dear Parents/Guardians:

Treynor Community Schools has adopted a new strategy for lockdown procedures known as the A.L.I.C.E. plan. A.L.I.C.E. is an acronym for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. Prior to the A.L.I.C.E. plan, lockdown procedures involved the staff locking their doors, moving the students to a part of the room where they could not be seen, and quietly remaining there until an "all clear" announcement was given. The A.L.I.C.E plan offers a different philosophy in light of case studies completed by law enforcement around school violence. The philosophy of A.L.I.C.E. is to use technology and information in a way so that staff and students can make informed decisions in a crisis, remove as many people as possible from the danger zone, and provide realistic training so that those involved in a crisis have a better chance of surviving.

The A.L.I.C.E. plan will be implemented at all buildings; however, the middle school and high school will drill in phases, with the first drill being executed by the end of October. Teachers will provide direction to the students on what action needs to be taken, so it is very important that students listen and follow the directions given, as this drill is not predictable like a fire drill or tornado drill. Before the first drill is performed, the individual classroom teachers will use a common set of guidelines to address this topic and teach their class the A.L.I.C.E. plan.

The first drill performed by the end of October will include an ALERT in the form of an announcement from the principal notifying everyone in the building of the location of the "danger zone." Those areas of the building within the "danger zone" will practice LOCKDOWN and discuss alternate exits from the classroom, such as a window, but will not physically exit their classroom during the first drill. The principal will continue to INFORM the building of any changes in the "danger zone." Those classrooms not in the "danger zone" will practice the EVACUATE portion of the plan if hallways and exits are safe. The COUNTER portion of the plan will be taught simultaneously, but will not be practiced. Teachers will not know the location of the "danger zone" prior to the drill so that they can practice developing a strategy that provides the safest outcome for their students. Therefore, it is very important for the students to listen to the directions given by their teacher as the course of action during these drills will not always be the same.

Elementary students will not be participating in the A.L.I.C.E. drills and will be relying on their trained classroom teacher's instructions should such a crisis occur. Younger students will benefit from constant reminders of safe practices in order for them to make good decisions related to their personal safety. Parents can prepare their child(ren) for the A.L.I.C.E. plan by helping them at home to understand the following objectives:

- Self-confidence comes from trying things that are hard and getting better each time.
- There are many solutions and options when faced with a problem.
- Your child is smart and capable if he/she has the knowledge.
- Discuss the importance of following the teacher's directions without hesitation.
