"District Details"...a few notes from Superintendent Howell

Happy holidays to all of you from me – and the entire staff of the Treynor Community School District! This is the greatest school in which to work and learn - all because of you, our parents and community members, and our students. We love serving in this great school.



The holidays are happy, fun and exciting for all of us. Our kids love the break from school and a chance to see friends and relatives. There are always special foods, music and family traditions. With all the festivities during this busy holiday season, stress can become a factor, even for our kids. Here are a few tips appropriate for all of us to help them manage their stress.

- Discuss holiday plans in advance, and let kids participate in decisions. Kids need some degree of predictability. Prolonged uncertainty, constantly changing plans or last-minute decisions can all increase stress for our kids.
- If you're traveling, leave plenty of extra time and bring snacks, books, games and/or music. It's amazing how travel increases stress levels of many kids, but with a little planning that time can actually be a de-stressor.
- Don't over schedule. You may not be able to do everything or see everyone.
 Kids can easily get "burned out," overtired and cranky during the holidays.
- Give kids some "down time." Don't expect them to be "on" all the time. Leave room for some quiet activities, like listening to music, taking a walk or reading a book – even their favorite video game.
- Make sure kids get plenty of sleep. While it may be exciting to stay up late, lack
 of sleep often leads to increased irritability. Yes, it's those two words structure
 and predictability. We as adults need it (and love it) and so do our kids. (They
 don't usually admit it! Ha!)
- Let kids be honest about their feelings. Don't force them to act happy and excited if they're feeling quiet or down.
- Don't promise things you can't produce. For example, don't promise a parent/ grandparent/favorite aunt will be home in time for the holidays if the decision is really out of your control. Surprises when they do arrive are so much more funthan disappointments when the "favorites" aren't able to join the festivities.
- Uphold and maintain family traditions. Kids count on certain traditions. They can
 have an important grounding effect by letting kids know that even though some
 things have changed, other things have remained the same. Watch that funny
 Christmas movie you have all seen "a million times," do the traditional toboggan
 run, or cozy up by the fire with the hot chocolate (and extra marshmallows).
- What most kids really want is your time, attention and reassurance. We are often surprised just how much our kids really want us, even more than all the toys and gifts. Sitting down with them to play that favorite board game, re-reading for the thousandth time that Christmas story, talking about their favorite music those are the things that will be what they remember in years to come.

SUPERINTENDENT SEARCH UPDATE

The following are the key dates for the superintendent search:

- Nov. 16: The position was posted on Teachlowa by Lou Howell. Other postings were completed by Grundmeyer Leaders search firm.
- Jan. 6: Deadline for all applications.
- Jan. 24: Closed board session to enable board to determine a short list of candidates for digital interviews.
- Jan. 30: Closed board session to complete digital interviews, followed by determination of 2-4 finalists to be interviewed.
- Feb. 13: Formal interviews with teams representing students, teachers, staff, administrators, community members, and board members.
- Feb. 13: Closed board session followed by an open session to review the formal interviews and determine the new superintendent.

CAUTION: Changes in weather arriving soon...

As the weather begins to change, school cancellations and early dismissals can occur at anytime. If severe weather causes school to be cancelled prior to the start of the day, we will try to have information to the media by 6:30 a.m. In addition to our school website, the media outlets that will carry our announcements this year are: KMA, WOWT, KMTV and KETV.



If weather or unforeseen circumstances (loss of power or water) should occur during the day and school is dismissed early, <u>PLEASE HAVE A PLAN IN PLACE WITH</u> <u>YOUR CHILD.</u> When early dismissals occur during the day, we usually have limited time to get information out and many parents aren't aware that an early out has

taken place. Also, we have over 800 students in the district and only a couple of phone lines in each building. Don't assume that your child will be able to call you if a decision is made to dismiss school during the regular day. Have a plan in place! The elementary has forms <u>for each parent to keep updated</u> outlining your family's specific plan to deal with this type of situation. Parents of middle school and high school students need to discuss with their child what plan of action they will take in the event of an early dismissal during the school day. Proper planning now will provide assurance to you and your child that all will be okay should we ever have an unforeseen early dismissal.

Our student information database, JMC, will be used for all school notifications (voice, email, text). Please check your contact information to ensure it is up-to-date so you will receive these messages for school closings, late starts or early dismissals. Use the JMC Parent Access portal to check your contact information and make any additions or corrections as needed and to indicate how you want to receive notifications.
