Cardinal Financial Literacy Update

Financial Literacy Month

Here are some tips for raising a money-smart kid:

<u>Set the example.</u> Children learn a lot from their parents. Be an example of a responsible money manager by paying bills on time, being a conscious spender and an active saver. Look for opportunities to talk about money, read aloud books and play games that center around spending money wisely.

<u>Discuss needs vs. wants.</u> Family shopping trips are good opportunities to discuss budgeting, spending and saving. It's easy to give clear examples of "needs" and "wants," using different kinds of foods at a grocery store: Milk (for strong bones) is a need; soft drinks are a want.

Divide and conquer. Have children begin budgeting by dividing their allowance or any money they receive into three jars labeled *sharing*, *spending*, and *saving*. Our kindergarten students use these (called "Moonjars") in our in-school banking program. Children could then deposit 10 percent of their money or (\$1 for every \$10) in the sharing jar, 30 percent (\$3 for every \$10) into the spending jar, and 60 percent into the saving jar.

<u>Bank on knowledge.</u> Take your children to your bank and show them how transactions work. Ask a bank manager to explain how the bank operates, how money generates interest and how an ATM works. Ask the manager for a tour -- be sure to ask to see the vault!

Pay by the chore. Make a list of all the chores that need to get done around the house, such as weeding the garden, washing the car, sweeping the garage or dusting the living room. Put a dollar amount next to each chore. Then work with your children to prioritize the chores based upon how much money they need this week or month.

Budget, budget. Have older teens list expenses and income. Under expenses, include what they spend for movies, games, lunches, etc. Have them subtract expenses from income. Help them think of ways to reduce their spending. If their income is more than expenses, talk about a savings plan.

Plan on a budget. Tell your children to pretend they are in charge of planning a birthday party at home for another child. Four of their friends will be at the party. Estimate the total cost. Suppose the party is lunch at a local restaurant. Estimate the total cost. Suppose the party is a trip to a local amusement park or bowling alley. Estimate the total cost.

<u>Save on back-to-school shopping.</u> When it's time to go back-to-school shopping, discuss with your children alternative or less expensive items than what is listed on their school supply list. Then compare how much they'll save. Discuss with them ways to save money throughout the year by packing a lunch, using all pages in notebooks and using book covers.

Commonly Asked Questions

Parents often ask some of the same questions which I am glad to answer. This article tries to address a lot of commonly asked questions in regard to college planning.

1. When should my student take the ACT?

There is no magic time to take the ACT. My usual response is to take the ACT during the junior year but it can be taken earlier. A good rule of thumb is to take the ACT when a student is enrolled in Algebra II. There is a lot of geometry and algebra on the ACT and sometimes it is helpful to take the ACT while enrolled in Algebra II. For sure, a student who is applying to four year colleges should take the ACT at least during the junior year so they will have an ACT score to use to apply to four year colleges in the fall of the senior year.

2. Should a student take the ACT more than once?

ACT reports that 55% of students that take the ACT a second time raiser their score. Realize that it obviously benefits ACT monetarily for students to take the test multiple times. But the 55% figure is a reasonable expectation. Students should do some type of preparation prior to taking the test. The most beneficial preparation is just doing practice tests.

3. If a student takes the ACT a second time, does that hurt the student's chance of admission to a college?

No. Colleges will take the highest score.

4. What is the score that a student should get on the ACT to be admitted?

A 20 composite score is commonly seen as a major indicator of four year college success. It actually varies college to college. Some colleges have higher admission standards so the ACT score requirement will be higher. Other colleges may have lower admission standards. To be sure, check the college website and click on admissions for the freshman admission requirements. Or call the admissions office and speak to a college admissions representative.

5. How can I find more information about college and career choices for my son/daughter?

The State of Iowa has provided an excellent resource for all Iowa schools called I Have a Plan. It is a web based college and career information center that has a great deal of information about colleges and careers. The website is administrated through the Iowa College Student Aid Commission. Go to: www.ihaveaplaniowa.gov. Click on "Create and Account" to register and establish your individual account. The account sets up an individual portfolio which is an electronic file drawer that is your own personal access to I Have a Plan. I Have a Plan has an interest inventory, a skills assessment, a values sorter and many other resources that are available to help students and parents in the career/college search process. It also has free ACT and SAT test prep resources. There is also a link on the THS counseling website to I Have a Plan.

6. Should my student take the ACT Writing exam?

Most of the colleges in the Midwest do not require the writing exam. But check out the admissions requirement for possible future colleges on the college website and see what is required. Also, ACT has college admission requirement information on its website in terms of whether the writing exam is required. The writing exam is an additional \$15.50 charge.

7. Are all students required to take the ACT?

No. The ACT is usually required by four year colleges to be able to grant admission after graduating out of high school. Students who plan to go to a community college or a career and technical college can probably use the Compass test which is much shorter and less demanding. Compass tests can be set up through the IWCC Testing Center.

8. Can the high school transfer my student's college credit to another college?

No. College credit is granted by a college not a high school. If a student needs college credit transferred from a community college like IWCC, the process involved is to complete the IWCC Transcript Request Form. On the form it will have a section to complete to have the college transcript sent to a destination college. That form can be found on the THS website on the counseling page in the links section.

- 1. Attend Iowa Private College Week August 6-10, 2012. (See article above.)
- Put together a portfolio of information to be ready to fill out college scholarship applications.
 Accumulate information in regard to activities, honors and awards, volunteer and community service accomplishments. This makes it easier to complete scholarship applications and college admission applications.
- 3. Volunteer in service opportunities and then list them on applications for scholarships.
- 4. Spend time surfing college web sites to learn about prospective colleges and narrow your list to 3-5 colleges.

Class of 2013: Plan College Visits for Fall, 2012

The fall is a busy time with the start of school, fall athletics, fall music and speech activities. Now is a good time to begin to think about scheduling college visits to prospective colleges. It is best to go in the fall before snow blankets the campus. It is important for parents to arrange time off from work to go on the visit. Check college web sites or call college admission offices for individual and group visit days. The campus visit is the single most important factor in deciding which college to attend. Planning ahead and coordinating school and work schedules can be tricky, but looking ahead can give you a day that will work well for students and parents.
