"District Details"...a few notes from Superintendent Elwood

District Enrollment Continues to Grow.....

Enrollment in the Treynor Community School District increased by 15 students for the 2012-13 school year. The Certified Enrollment report was compiled and submitted to the Iowa Department of Education during the month of October. For the current school year, we will serve 774 students in grades K-12.

Treynor has had an enrollment growth trend for many years. During a span of the last 16 years, we have been fortunate to experience an increase in enrollment 15 of those years. We continue to have a large number of students elect to open enroll into Treynor to participate in the outstanding academic and extra-curricular programs that we offer. This

year, 226 students, about 29% of the district's enrollment, have elected to attend school at Treynor through the open enrollment option.

Earth Moving Equipment Begins Sculpting New Site...

On Wednesday, October 24th, grading work on the site of the new athletic complex began. TAB Construction was awarded the contract for completion of the grading and storm water infrastructure. McArdle Grading is the subcontractor that will be completing the grading work. The contractors have a 40 day window to finish the grading and storm water piping portion of the project. If all goes according to plan, their work will be completed this fall and the site will be allowed to settle and compact naturally during the winter months.

During the late fall and early winter, our engineers and architects will be involved with developing the remaining construction plans. After the first of the year, the Board of Education will take bids on the majority of the construction work. Our projected plans are to begin construction of the stadium and site amenities next spring with a goal of having the complex ready for football next fall. Keep your eyes on the project over the next few weeks and you will begin to see the site layout take shape.

CASH FOR STUDENTS



The "Cash for Students" program has begun. Hy-Vee cash register receipts dated from September 1 through December 31, 2012 will be collected in the Elementary, Middle School and High School offices. Hy-Vee gives back \$1.00 for every \$200 spent in any of the fourteen Omaha and Council Bluffs locations up to a maximum of \$2,000. Over \$403,000 in much needed funds has been donated to area schools as a result of this program. All of our proceeds go to the Athletic Booster Club. Remember to save your receipts and turn them in to any of the school offices!

CAUTION: Changes in weather arriving soon...

As the weather begins to change, school cancellations and early dismissals can occur at anytime. If severe weather causes school to be cancelled prior to the start of the day, we will try to have information to the media by 6:30 a.m. In addition to our school website, the media outlets that will carry our announcements this year are: KMA, WOWT, KMTV and KETV.



If weather or unforeseen circumstances (loss of power or water) should occur during the day and school is dismissed early, <u>PLEASE HAVE A PLAN IN PLACE WITH</u> YOUR CHILD. When early dismissals occur during the day, we usually have limited

time to get information out and many parents aren't aware that an early out has taken place. Also, we have over 750 students in the district and only a couple of phone lines in each building. Don't assume that your child will be able to call you if a decision is made to dismiss school during the regular day. Have a plan in place! The elementary has forms <u>for each parent to keep updated</u> outlining your family's specific plan to deal with this type of situation. Parents of middle school and high school students need to discuss with their child what plan of action they will take in the event of an early dismissal during the school day. Proper planning now will provide assurance to you and your child that all will be okay should we ever have an unforeseen early dismissal.

A new Parent Notification system has been purchased to allow Treynor school officials to communicate school cancellations, early dismissals, emergency information, activity schedule changes and general notices or announcements to parents in a timely and efficient manner. Parents have the ability to sign up and select multiple methods for receiving notifications from the school (direct phone calls with recorded voice messages, text messages, emails, text-to-speech, TTY, Facebook, Twitter and RSS). Check the website for updates regarding this new service and sign up on the webpage by clicking on "Quick Links" and then "Notifications".

Read about Cardinal Connections & Red Ribbon Week!

The first quarter has been very active and meaningful for both our teachers and students. All of our teachers in the district attended a workshop in Harlan called "The 21st Century Technology Conference" where they were able to see how teachers are using technology in their classrooms in various schools throughout the area. Our teachers will continue to use in-serve and professional development time during first semester to investigate various ways to incorporate technology and they will continue to implement technology into their lessons.

The middle school students Cardinal Connections theme this year is "Vote for Your Future", which is relevant to what is going on in our country right now with elections right around the corner. So, we started making connections between voting (what this means) and how voting is similar to choices that they have in their everyday lives. At some point in their lives, they may be in situations where they are given the choice of whether to partake in alcohol and/or drugs. To help with the prevention of this happening, Dan Clark presented a Drug and Alcohol Prevention Assembly. Dan's knowledge and experiences he has had with the Omaha Police Department in high risk assignments, such as SWAT, K-9, gang and narcotics teams, were shared with the students. During his presentation, he showed a power-point that included before/after pictures of people who started taking drugs, mainly methamphetamines. The students were also able to view samples of drugs that he held as students walked out of the presentation.

In October, we continued with Drug and Alcohol Prevention, particularly during and leading up to "Red Ribbon Week", which was October 22-26. The students were all given the task to think about their future and focus on specific goals that they had for themselves. Once the students determined their goals, they were asked to write these goals down on "I'm Voting for My Future" ballots, knowing that the possibility of reaching those goals are very unlikely if they make the decision to choose drugs or alcohol over striving for these goals. In winding up our efforts regarding the prevention of using drugs and alcohol, our MS Student Council determined dress up days and made posters advertising how to dress up each day during "Red Ribbon Week." The various days dress attire consisted of the following; "I'm Voting for My Future" (red/white/blue), "Black Out Drugs" (black), "Put a cap on drugs" (wore a cap), and "I'm too bright for drugs" (bright colors). We are looking forward to the month of November, where we will change our focus to things for which we are grateful and will hopefully do some service learning. It is unbelievable that the first quarter of the 2012-2013 school year is over. The students have been wonderful in accepting me into their family and I am proud to be a Treynor Cardinal. Within the high school, the teachers have been researching and implementing different strategies to better incorporate the usage of the students' computers. As a whole staff, we participated in the Green Hills AEA 21st Century Learners conference in Harlan. We are using our professional development days to investigate and implement technology websites and programs into our lessons with the assistance of our tech support: the Treynor Technology committee, the Green Hills AEA, and our Technology Director Shelly Bailey. Our vision for having every student with a com-



puter is a paperless, more student-centered classroom within the high school. With that vision, the high school staff and administration are researching the most adaptable and efficient Learning Management System (LMS), along with teaching strategies and technology that will enable our lessons to be student-centered. A LMS is a software application that allows teachers and administration the ability to assemble and deliver lessons and assignments over the web along with multiple other abilities.

In conjunction and with the support from TS Bank, the middle school and high school had the opportunity to listen to John Pritiken. He discussed the importance of "Being a Hero" to the student body and how important acceptance is to all students. Mixed in with his message, John demonstrated his power and ability to roll a metal frying pan with his hands, bend a steel bar with his teeth, and break a baseball bat over his leg. Cardinal Financial Literacy Update

The Allowance Dilemma: Teaching Your Kids to Save



The allowance experience can provide hands-on training for a financially responsible future. But, before offering your kids their first allowance, here are some things you should consider.

Decide on your "allowance philosophy". Before establishing an allowance for your children, first determine your "allowance philoso-phy". Should an allowance be given without expectations for chores completed, school grades or good behavior? Some parents believe that an allowance given without expectations in return may lead to an "entitlement" mentality.

Or, should your children's allowance be compensation for work done? With this philosophy, some parents believe that it will mirror job situations the child is likely to encounter a few years down the road.

Whichever allowance philosophy works for your family, make certain you communicate it clearly, and agree upon the rules together. Giving an allowance should be a learning opportunity and not a power struggle.

How much, and when? Once you've determined your allowance philosophy, you may find yourself asking two questions:

- How much should I give my children?
- How old should my children be to start receiving an allowance?

The answer to the first question is often dictated by your financial situation. However, other issues also should be taken into consideration, including how you expect your children to use the money. Is it strictly for use on items of their choosing, or will you direct them to donate a portion to charity? What other items will they be responsible for? For example, a child who uses an allowance to buy school lunches will have additional expenses so could get more than one who isn't expected to buy their lunch.

As for savings, it's important to make it a habit. Giving your children some type of piggy bank can be a good way to help them get in the habit of savings. Then—once there is a sizable amount in the bank, say \$50—taking them to a local bank or credit union to set up an account can be a valuable experience.

As for the question about at what age should a child get an allowance, according to the book, <u>Yes, You</u> <u>Can...Raise Financially Aware Kids</u>, it is appropriate to start giving an allowance when they enter first grade. If, as your children age, they ask for a bigger allowance, have them keep a daily journal of all their expenses for one week. Then go over the diary with them and ask challenging questions about each expense, such as:

- Did you really need it?
- If you had the choice, would you rather have the money back or are you completely satisfied with your purchase?
- Could you have found it elsewhere for less?; and
- Did you get your money's worth?

These discussions can help your children think about how they are using their money and better understand the value of the allowance they receive.

CARDINAL FINANCIAL LITERACY CONT'D.

Use these discussions to celebrate their victories, such as staying within their budget for successive weeks, saving for a big ticket item or donating an amount to charity. Also, discuss ways to improve upon their financial challenges. For example, if they are constantly running out of money, then talk about the reasons why and what they can do to prevent it from happening. Where are they spending too much? Are there other ways to get the same item or experience at a lower expense? For example, buying clothes at a discount store or renting a movie instead of going to the theater.

While there are a number of theories about the best way to manage allowances, one thing is certain—the ultimate goal of an allowance is to help your child learn to manage money responsibly.

Setting a Course for Financial Independence



Research has shown that it takes at least 21 days to form a new habit. That means, over the next three weeks, you can start changing how you think about money and set yourself on the path to improving your financial position.

Start by setting realistic and achievable goals.

Keep them small. Don't set a goal you can't achieve. It may be easier to cut out several small expenses than a single big one.

Make them measurable. Instead of saying you'll "spend less", set a goal to reduce spending by a specific amount.

Write them down. If you can put your goals on paper, you're more likely to stick to them.

Limit the number. Don't try to do too much at once. It's better to have several small successes than one big failure.

Create an action plan. Track your progress on a calendar. This can help keep you going. If you haven't already, create a

spending plan. This will let you see, penny-by-penny, how you're using your money.

Don't be discouraged if you miss_goal. Improving your financial position is a long-term process that requires_ patience and a disciplined approach.

Financial Aid Meeting for Seniors and Parents: Tuesday, Nov. 13

The annual Financial Aid Meeting for seniors and their parents will be sponsored by THS on **Tuesday, November 13, 2012 at 7:00 p.m.** Any senior who is considering post-high school education should attend no matter whether it would be a four year college, two year college, or one year technical school. Essential information on the financial aid process will be presented. The meeting will last about one hour. Packets of information will be distributed.

The Iowa College Access Network (ICAN formerly the College Planning Center) from Des Moines will be making a presentation covering the topics:

- Completing the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)
- Electronic processing
- Deadlines
- > Overview of the financial aid process
- > Types of financial assistance available
- Scholarships and scams
- Helpful tips
- Places to go for help

What Needs to Get Done for College Now?

The fall is a busy time for seniors to get a lot of important things done for college planning. Here are some of the things that need to get accomplished in the fall:

- 1. **Complete and send college applications**. Applying does not commit a student to a college. It simply means that the student is interested and is seeking admission. Admission opens a communication line between the college and the student.
- 2. **Campus visits.** It is essential to get campus visits done before the December. In December the weather can turn cold and snowy, and college campuses begin to shut down for the end of the semester. Students involved in activities and athletics may want to plan around those activities before the schedule gets busy.
- 3. Attend the Financial Aid Meeting at THS on Tuesday, Nov. 13, 2012 at 7:00 p.m. It is a very important meeting to help students and families learn about the financial aid process.
- 4. **Register for a PIN** (Personal Identification Number) to electronically sign the FAFSA in January or February. Both a senior student and one parent should register for a PIN. Go to: <u>www.pin.ed.gov</u>.
- 5. **Organize for scholarship applications.** Students should write a resume that will list the activities that have been involved in the school and community, awards that they have received, community service activities that they have been involved. Assembling all of this information will make scholarship applications much easier.
- If a student is admitted to a college, be ready to pay a housing deposit or enrollment (if needed) and look for scholarship information through the college as well as general scholarship searches: <u>www.fastweb.com</u>; <u>www.finaid.com</u>; scholarship search through <u>www.ihaveaplaniowa.gov</u>.

ACT Test Prep and Scholarship Finder on I Have a Plan Iowa www.ihaveaplaniowa.gov

A great resource that is available for all Iowa students is I Have a Plan Iowa (IHAPI). It is mainly used as a great source of career and college information for students. But it also has two helpful resources for students.

ACT Test Prep: IHAPI has ACT and SAT test prep resources on the website. All Treynor students should have an account established. If they have problems getting into their account, they can email Mr. Irvin for help. The ACT test prep covers each of the major sections of the test (English, math, reading, science reasoning). Each section has a set of slides that review important concepts in the subject area. Then there are practice questions that students can take to prepare for each test. All of this is <u>free</u>.

Scholarship Finder: IHAPI also has a scholarship search. This allows students to search by the profile that they build into the Scholarship Finder. Simply click on Financial Aid Planning on the main green menu bar. IHAPI also has an iowa Financial Aid application that can be used after January 1 to see if a student qualifies for financial aid on the state leve.
