A very emotional exhibit, "Remembering Our Fallen", is a sad reminder of the ultimate sacrifice made by over 80 lowans killed in The War on Terror while wearing our country's uniform in Afghanistan or Irag.

The warriors of the 21st Century are professionals who volunteered to join the United States Armed Forces, and grew up in the shadow of September 11, 2001, a defining moment for most of them. They come from all walks of life and every corner of our country, daring to go where so many never would. They retain the face of freedom and build upon the legacies of those who went before them in a cause greater than themselves.

Many have endured multiple deployments and most return home. Some do not.

"Remembering Our Fallen" was created to honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. Its' legacy will be that these men and women will never be forgotten and that their names will be remembered and spoken.

The "Remembering Our Fallen" photo exhibit will be on display at Treynor Middle School from November 11-15. The public is encouraged to stop by and view the exhibit between the hours of 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Thanks to the Lamar Hartje, American Legion Post #725 and TS Bank for serving as our local sponsors for the exhibit. CASH FOR STUDENTS



The "Cash for Students" program has begun. Hy-Vee cash register receipts dated from September 1 through December 31, 2013 will be collected in the Elementary, Middle School and High School offices. Hy-Vee gives back \$1.00 for every \$200 spent in any of the fourteen Omaha and Council Bluffs locations up to a maximum of \$2,000. Over 403,000 in much needed funds has been donated to area schools as a result of this program.

All of our proceeds go to the Athletic Booster Club. Remember to save your receipts and turn them in to any of the school offices!

CAUTION: Changes in weather arriving soon...

As the weather begins to change, school cancellations and early dismissals can occur at anytime. If severe weather causes school to be cancelled prior to the start of the day, we will try to have information to the media by 6:30 a.m. In addition to our school website, the media outlets that will carry our announcements this year are: **KMA**, **WOWT**, **KMTV** and **KETV**.



If weather or unforeseen circumstances (loss of power or water) should occur during the day and school is dismissed early, <u>PLEASE HAVE A PLAN IN PLACE WITH</u> <u>YOUR CHILD.</u> When early dismissals occur during the day, we usually have limited time to get information out and many parents aren't aware that an early out has taken

place. Also, we have over 750 students in the district and only a couple of phone lines in each building. Don't assume that your child will be able to call you if a decision is made to dismiss school during the regular day. Have a plan in place! The elementary has forms for each parent to keep updated outlining your family's specific plan to deal with this type of situation. Parents of middle school and high school students need to discuss with their child what plan of action they will take in the event of al early dismissal during the school day. Proper planning now will provide assurance to you and your child that all will be okay should we ever have an unfore-seen early dismissal.

A new Parent Notification system has been purchased to allow Treynor school officials to communicate school cancellations, early dismissals, emergency information, activity schedule changes and general notices or announcements to parents in a timely and efficient manner. Parents have the ability to sign up and select multiple methods for receiving notifications from the school (direct phone calls with recorded voice messages, text messages, emails, text-to-speech, TTY, Facebook, Twitter and RSS). Check the website for updates regarding this new service and sign up on the webpage by clicking on "Quick Links" and then "Notifications".

Students thought about hobbies, people or passions that were their anti-drugs, so to speak. They were asked to write these out and we now have them posted in our middle school commons to remind them of those people or things that have had a hand in keeping them away from drugs.

In conjunction with anti-drug awareness, "Red Ribbon Week" this year is October 28—November 1. The Middle School will have a competition between classes with the winning group having the highest participation percentage each day of the week. Our Middle School Student Council determined the dress up days and made posters advertising how to dress up each day. THOUGHTS FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL..... MR. NAVARA

Within the high school, the teachers have been researching and implementing different strategies to better incorporate the usage of the students' laptop computers. As a whole staff, we participated in the Green Hills AEA 21st Century Learners conference in Council Bluffs. We are going to use our professional development days to collaborate the usage of technology in the classroom through strategies and standards and benchmarks associated with the Iowa Core/Common Core. By examining the standards and recording what standards we teach, we are able to locate areas and standards in which we are strong and areas we lack. This in turn will guide us to strengthen our areas of weakness.



The high school math department has initiated the usage of online textbooks. As a department, they are tracking the positives and negatives of using an online textbook and try to assist with some of the struggles our students are facing with going textless. At the end of the year, we will discuss the pros and cons. Looking into mycrystal ball, I foresee the high school continuing on with online textbooks.

In conjunction and with the support from TS Bank, the middle school and high school had the opportunity to listen and experience Kent Julien. Kent demonstrated and explained the importance of making good decisions. The most dramatic demonstration was the drinking of lemonade (sweet decisions) with chocolate milk (sour decisions) and not to mix the two together. He did an actual demonstration of drinking one, then the other, along with mixing the two drinks together and drinking the combination. If you would like more of an explanation of the assembly, please ask any high school student. Continuing with our speaker series of good decisions and October being bullying/harassment prevention month, the high school had assemblies geared toward bullying/harassment and the possible outcomes given by Pottawattamie County Attorney's Office and the School Administrators of lowa legal adviser. Our message to the student body is to step up and speak out.

Cardinal Financial Literacy Update

How to teach saving...when savers can't get ahead today?

This month's newsletter focuses on teaching kids to save.

As parents, you know saving is a great skill to teach.

Saving money is the key to financial success. As such, we need to help everyone get that habit started. The earlier, the better. But where do you start?

First, every child should have - and use - a piggy bank or savings account. Learning to set aside some money is a great skill to have at every age. Some kids are natural savers and easily grasp the advantage of filling their piggy bank or depositing money into their savings account to buy a larger item later.

But as they see more and more things they want and **experience the "high" from spending**, even natural savers are tempted to spend more and save less.

The point is....**parents have a role coaching kids on how to save and spend** wisely. Learning to be a lifetime saver requires we **go beyond** the **piggy bank mentality.** How can you teach kids to do that?

There are 4 ways:

1. Add your own rewards

Banks currently can't offer much interest, but parents and grandparents can sweeten the deal. Set aside \$1 or even 25 cents for every dollar the kids put into their savings. You can add your matching amount to their savings account or put it into a 529 college savings account or Roth IRA (if the child has that in income).

Plus, give an extra reward when kids can resist pulling money out of their savings...a powerful reinforcement. Your goal? Let them see that savings pays off. Show kids the magic of compound interest - the math behind how their savings compound.

Don't think you have to supplement savings forever. When their savings grows quickly, kids can understand the benefit to continue the habit.

2. Teach about investing - stocks with dividends

Just like spending gets more sophisticated, so does saving. When kids have a nest egg in savings, introduce the concept of investing.

Dividend stocks offer a great learning experience, and can yield better rewards than the common savings account. (Remember investing rule #1: greater rewards bring greater risks.)

You don't have to invest large amounts to get this lesson across to kids. Please don't invest blindly or merely use a broker's recommendation. Instead -



- 1. Look for companies kids know and can easily follow, such as McDonalds, PepsiCo, Disney, Target, and Apple, to name a few.
- Research to understand how the company makes money, and how stockholders share the profit.
- 3. Follow the stock price to see volatility-the highs and lows (and riskiness).
- 4. Calculate how much is paid in dividends, plus see when and how it's paid.

3. Learn about leveraging, and buying assets

You might have an interesting lesson in your own back yard. If you are in 4-H, or have an ample space, you might consider the benefits of production - raising livestock (including chickens, rabbits, fish) to sell, growing veggies and garden produce for a farmers' market, or turning a patch of strawberries, blackberries or grapevines into a product like jelly/jam.

Of course, someone has to front the initial investment. Perhaps money comes from you and some from a kid's savings. You can decide who gets the profit (or loss), but this type of investing offers a multitude of business lessons in decision making, including forecasting expenses, income, and profits as well as creating a budget.

4. Discover entrepreneurial strategies

If your kids live in town or don't want to buy assets to improve and sell, you can still create entrepreneurial experiences in your neighborhood.

Look at setting them up to mow lawns, do yard chores, babysit, walk dogs, hold a garage sale, or have a lemonade stand. You can help them make a flyer to advertise their services and learn to make a budget. You can also get into supply costs and price-setting strategies.



5. Discuss consequences of NOT saving - namely, the costs of borrowing

If your kids are like most, there will be plenty of opportunity to talk about borrowing, such as:

- Your son wants a lawn mower to earn money and needs a loan to get it;
- . The allowance is spent, but money is needed for a movie or school book;
- · One daughter wants to borrow the other's new shoes;
- A great "opportunity of a lifetime" for a summer camp has been offered, and it's more than budgeted;
- It's time to consider a car.

The best time to discuss the costs of borrowing is before any money is needed



A parent can discuss expectations, budgets, and wants vs. needs.

Learning to use credit is a lifetime skill, but **SAVING** is the key.

You see, when it comes to being able to afford what you want, saving starts it all. **Saving gives you power**...power to invest, to build wealth, to reduce borrowing costs, and also the freedom to be in control when life hands you the unexpected lemon.

Financial Aid Meeting for Seniors and Parents: Tuesday, Nov. 26

The annual Financial Aid Meeting for seniors and their parents will be sponsored by THS on **Tuesday**, **November 26**, **2013 at 7:00 p.m.** Any senior who is considering post-high school education should attend no matter whether it would be a four year college, two year college, or one year technical school. Essential information on the financial aid process will be presented. The meeting will last about one hour. Packets of information will be distributed.

The Iowa College Access Network (ICAN formerly the College Planning Center) from Des Moines will be making a presentation covering the topics:

- Completing the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)
- Electronic processing
- > Deadlines
- Overview of the financial aid process
- > Types of financial assistance available
- Scholarships and scams
- Helpful tips
- Places to go for help

What Needs to Get Done for College Now?

The fall is a busy time for seniors to get a lot of important things done for college planning. Here are some of the things that need to get accomplished in the fall:

- Complete and send college applications. Applying does not commit a student to a college. It simply means
 that the student is interested and is seeking admission. Admission opens a communication line between the
 college and the student.
- 2. **Campus visits.** It is essential to get campus visits done before the December. In December the weather can turn cold and snowy, and college campuses begin to shut down for the end of the semester. Students involved in activities and athletics may want to plan around those activities before the schedule gets busy.
- 3. Attend the Financial Aid Meeting at THS on Tuesday, Nov. 26, 2013 at 7:00 p.m. It is a very important meeting to help students and families learn about the financial aid process.
- 4. **Register for a PIN** (Personal Identification Number) to electronically sign the FAFSA in January or February. Both a senior student and one parent should register for a PIN. Go to: <u>www.pin.ed.gov</u>.
- 5. **Organize for scholarship applications.** Students should write a resume that will list the activities that have been involved in the school and community, awards that they have received, community service activities that they have been involved. Assembling all of this information will make scholarship applications much easier.
- If a student is admitted to a college, be ready to pay a housing deposit or enrollment (if needed) and look for scholarship information through the college as well as general scholarship searches: <u>www.fastweb.com</u>; <u>www.finaid.com</u>; scholarship search through <u>www.ihaveaplaniowa.gov</u>.
- If you have other questions or want more information, go the counseling web page at <u>http://www.treynorschools.org</u> or the ICAN web site: <u>www.icansucceed.org</u> or call or email the high school counselor, Mr. Irvin.

ACT Test Prep and Scholarship Finder on I Have a Plan Iowa www.ihaveaplaniowa.gov

A great resource that is available for all Iowa students is I Have a Plan Iowa (IHAPI). It is mainly used as a great source of career and college information for students. But it also has two helpful resources for students.

ACT Test Prep: IHAPI has ACT and SAT test prep resources on the website. All Treynor students should have an account established. If they have problems getting into their account, they can email Mr. Irvin for help. The ACT test prep covers each of the major sections of the test (English, math, reading, science reasoning). Each section has a set of slides that review important concepts in the subject area. Then there are practice questions that students can take to prepare for each test. All of this is <u>free</u>.

Scholarship Finder: IHAPI also has a scholarship search. This allows students to search by the profile that they build into the Scholarship Finder. Simply click on Financial Aid Planning on the main green menu bar. IHAPI also has an iowa Financial Aid application that can be used after January 1 to see if a student qualifies for financial aid on the state leve.

Scholarship Central

A wealth of information on scholarships can be found on Scholarship Central on the Treynor School website. There are scholarship help links and a listing of all scholarships that come through the counseling office along with the last school year's listings of scholarships. We are moving into the busy scholarship season so seniors need to check the webpage each week. Go to www.treynorschools.org --> click on Counseling --> click on Scholarship Central.
