District Enrollment Continues to Grow.....

Enrollment in the Treynor Community School District increased by 7 students for the 2014-15 school year. The Certified Enrollment report was compiled and submitted to the Iowa Department of Education during the month of October. For the current school year we will serve 775 students in grades K - 12.

Treynor has had an enrollment growth trend for many years.

During a span of the last 18 years, we have been fortunate to experience an increase in enrollment 16 of those years. We

CASH FOR STUDENTS



The "Cash for Students" program has begun. Hy-Vee cash register receipts dated from September 1 through December 31, 2014 will be collected in the Elementary, Middle School and High School offices. Hy-Vee gives back \$1.00 for every \$200 spent in any of the fourteen Omaha and Council Bluffs locations up to a maximum of \$2,000. Over 403,000 in much needed funds has been donated to area schools as a result of this program.

All of our proceeds go to the Athletic Booster Club. Remember to save your receipts and turn them in to any of the school offices!

CAUTION: Changes in weather arriving soon...

As the weather begins to change, school cancellations and early dismissals can occur at anytime. If severe weather causes school to be cancelled prior to the start of the day, we will try to have information to the media by 6:30 a.m. In addition to our school website, the media outlets that will carry our announcements this year are: **KMA**, **WOWT**, **KMTV** and **KETV**.



If weather or unforeseen circumstances (loss of power or water) should occur during the day and school is dismissed early, <u>PLEASE HAVE A PLAN IN PLACE WITH</u> <u>YOUR CHILD.</u> When early dismissals occur during the day, we usually have limited

time to get information out and many parents aren't aware that an early out has taken place. Also, we have over 750 students in the district and only a couple of phone lines in each building. Don't assume that your child will be able to call you if a decision is made to dismiss school during the regular day. Have a plan in place! The elementary has forms for each parent to keep updated outlining your family's specific plan to deal with this type of situation. Parents of middle school and high school students need to discuss with their child what plan of action they will take in the event of al early dismissal during the school day. Proper planning now will provide assurance to you and your child that all will be okay should we ever have an unforeseen early dismissal.

Our student information database, JMC, will be used for all school notifications (voice, email, text). Please check your contact information to ensure it is up-to-date so you will receive these messages for school closings, late starts or early dismissals. Use the JMC Parent Access portal to check your contact information and make any additions or corrections as needed and to indicate how you want to receive notifications.

FINANCIAL LITERACY UPDATE



Determine Your Net Worth



For many families and individuals, creating a retirement savings plan is difficult. According to a survey completed in February during America Saves Week, only about one-third of Americans say they're making "good" or "excellent" progress in saving for their future. The problem for many is they don't know where they currently stand financially, so it is difficult to envision what they will need for the long-term.

Getting started on a long-term plan is much easier when you have a place to start, like knowing your net worth.

Determining your net worth isn't as difficult as it might

sound Your net worth is simply the difference between your assets (what you own) and your liabilities (what you owe). With a little addition and subtraction, you can determine where you stand right now.

-Start by making a list of both categories. Your assets include things such as guaranteed income, the money you have in your personal bank accounts, the value of your retirement savings accounts, the equity in your home and other real estate, any vehicles or other personal items and any other investments you

own.

If you're not sure of the current value of your home, check with a real estate agent or an online resource, such as Realestate.com or Zillow.com. Be sure to get an appraisal of items like antiques, jewelry and artwork to make sure you have the correct value attached; both for the sake of your net worth estimation and in the event you would ever need to know their replacement value in case they are damaged or stolen.

Next, write down all your liabilities. These are things like your mortgage, any outstanding loans, credit card debts and personal financial obligations. Once you total both columns and subtract your liabilities from your assets, you will have a snapshot picture of your net worth.

Assessing your balance sheet

Armed with this information, you can better determine how much of a cushion you have against unexpected financial situations and you should be able to identify any weaknesses in your saving or investment strategy, especially if you are nearing retirement age. Plus, you can decide how you might use some of the assets which make up your net worth to help carry you through retirement. Do you need to reduce or eliminate some of your liabilities? Do you need to earn more money to help pay off your debt faster?

Keep in mind that these figures are fluid

It is important to remember that your net worth can fluctuate over your lifetime depending on market and real estate conditions, changes in your employment and whether you increase or decrease your debt. In order to keep a realistic perspective of your net worth, you should recalculate it periodically. This way, if it looks like your nest egg is dipping below a level that feels comfortable to you, you can make any necessary changes in your spending, saving and investing patterns.
