"District Details"...a few notes from the Superintendent

Happy November! What a fall it has been – so many great things happening in our district, in the classroom and on the court and field. The football team experienced its first play-off game in several years. We had four runners in the state cross country event in Fort Dodge. Our volleyball team is gearing up for state – just one more win to get us there. The marching band (largest band in the history of Treynor with 78 musicians) continued to outdo themselves and made us all proud of their accomplishments. I must confess, I do miss seeing the cross country team running those early morning hours. I wish that I had that energy and commitment!

October 1 is an important date in every school in Iowa; it's the day we determine our certified enrollment, which determines the state funding we receive. While it takes the entire month to verify the data, it continues to look good for Treynor! We are serving 835.48 students (814.51 students last year), including 273.4 open enrollment students and 562.3 Treynor resident students. Last year, we were "up" 4.07 students and this year we are "up" 23.10 students – all Treynor resident students, a great sign of growth in our community. We continue to celebrate teaching the most students in the conference!

District student enrollment is up again this year!

CAUTION: Changes in weather arriving soon...

As the weather begins to change, school cancellations and early dismissals can occur at anytime. If severe weather causes school to be cancelled prior to the start of the day, we will try to have information to the media by 6:30 a.m. In addition to our school website, the media outlets that will carry our announcements this year are: **KMA**, **WOWT, KMTV and KETV.**



If weather or unforeseen circumstances (loss of power or water) should occur during the day and school is dismissed early, **PLEASE HAVE A PLAN IN PLACE WITH**

YOUR CHILD. When early dismissals occur during the day, we usually have limited time to get information out and many parents aren't aware that an early out has taken place. Also, we have over 800 students in the district and only a couple of phone lines in each building. Don't assume that your child will be able to call you if a decision is made to dismiss school during the regular day. Have a plan in place! The elementary has forms for each parent to keep updated outlining your family's specific plan to deal with this type of situation. Parents of middle school and high school students need to discuss with their child what plan of action they will take in the event of an early dismissal during the school day. Proper planning now will provide assurance to you and your child that all will be okay should we ever have an unforeseen early dismissal.

Our student information database, JMC, will be used for all school notifications (voice, email, text). Please check your contact information to ensure it is up-to-date so you will receive these messages for school closings, late starts or early dismissals. Use the JMC Parent Access portal to check your contact information and make any additions or corrections as needed and to indicate how you want to receive notifications.

COMMIT TO BE FIT!

How is your media diet?

Media and digital devices are an integral part of our world. The benefits of these devices can be great. But, research has shown that face-to-face time with family and friends plays an even more important role in promoting children's learning and healthy development. Don't let the face-to-face time get lost behind a stream of media and technology.



Things to consider:

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- Actively engage in exploring the digital world with your child.
- Designate media-free times together, such as dinner or driving.
- Choose to be physically active during TV commercials such as doing leg lifts, knee bends or jumping jacks.
- Charge phones overnight in a specified area outside of the bedroom.
- Choose high-quality programming and watch it together so you can discuss it.
- Make sure media does not replace adequate sleep, physical activity and other behaviors essential to good health.
- Abstain from media for an hour before bedtime (the blue light can interfere with sleep).

SCHOOL BREAKFAST—A HEALTHY CHOICE!



For parents with busy schedules, it can be hard to make sure that kids are eating a healthy breakfast before they go to school in the morning.

Sometimes children aren't hungry right after waking up, and it's hard to find food they like to eat that is also healthy. Also, some kids refuse breakfast at home but are hungry when they arrive at school. Fortunately, we have a great breakfast program for all students, and it's available at school every day.

ON TO COLLEGE TEST PREP Free ACT Test Prep offered to Treynor students For the last five years Treynor High School has offered the "On to College Test Prep" program (formerly known as John Baylor Test Prep) to high school students at no charge. On average our students see a two-point gain on the ACT from the first to the second test taken after completing the "On to College Test Prep" program immediately preceding the second test. We have had some students increase their score, 4, 6, even 8 points! What is "On to College Test Prep"? The "On to College Test Prep" program is an online curriculum which allows the students to complete the 12 -40 minute sessions or 24 - 20 minute sessions when it is convenient for them. Some may choose to do it during their Card Pride time, while others may do it during their Study Hall or at home in the evening. Each student who signs up to do the test prep will receive their own account to log into and a red folder. In the red folder they will have paper copies of the curriculum binder, English passages, and a practice test. They will use the information in the folder during each online session. In each session John Baylor walks students through test taking tips and sample problems. He reviews grammar rules and math & science concepts. He shows students how to work math problems and shows why certain answers are better options. He uses a fast pace approach to help students get used to the pace they will need to successfully complete each of the subtests on the ACT. Who should do the "On to College Test Prep"? All Juniors who intend on attending a 4-year post-secondary institution after high school should have taken the ACT by the end of their Junior year. Seniors who intend on going to a 4-year post-secondary institution should take it again if they want to improve their chances at admission or increase scholarships. If students intend on taking the ACT at least twice, they should do the test prep prior to their second time testing. If a student only plans on taking the test once, they should take the test prep prior to that test. When should students do "On to College Test Prep"? Students should get signed up for the test prep at least four weeks prior to their test date. Students can sign up for a refresher course two weeks prior to a test date only if they have completed the entire test prep sessions prior to a previous test date. How can students get signed up for "On to College Test Prep"? Students sign up by emailing Ms. Laughlin that they want to do the "On to College Test Prep" program and which date they plan on taking the test. She will create an account for each student and get students set up to do the course. Reminders are put in the school announcements prior to each test date to have students sign up for the program by emailing Ms. Laughlin. When are future ACT test dates? December 8, February 9, April 13, June 8 and July 13 (R)

HIGH IMPACT STRATEGY—MULTIPLE EXPOSURES

Multiple Exposures provide students with multiple opportunities to encounter, engage with, and elaborate on new knowledge and skills. Research demonstrates deep learning develops over time via multiple, spaced interactions with new knowledge and concepts. This may require spacing practice over several days, and using different activities to vary the interactions learners have with new knowledge.

different activities to vary the interactions learners have with new knowledge. Key elements: Students have time to practice what they have learned. Timely feedback provides opportunities for immediate correction and improvement. MS/HS example Elementary example Our district has chosen the Charlotte Danielson's Framework for Teaching to use as our instructional framework. The Framework for Teaching is a research-based set of components of instruction, aligned to the IN-TASC standards, and grounded in a constructivist view of learning and teaching. The complex activity of teaching is divided into 22 components (and 76 smaller elements) clustered into four domains of teaching responsibility. The ISEA used the work of Danielson to create A Framework For Understanding the Iowa Teaching Standards and Criteria. What Does Danielson Say About Multiple Exposures? Domain 1 1c: "Instructional outcomes should reflect a balance among different types of learning." Domain 3 3C: "Student engagement consists of several distinct, though related, elements, such as activities and assignments, grouping of students, materials and resources, and structure and pacing." Mrs. Beck's 7th grade reading class is participating in the Global Read Aloud program. Check out all the connections that are out there for our students.
